Doug Golden Scholarship Helps Desiree Miller Expand her Role at Atlantic Railways

Atlantic Railways Executive Assistant Desiree Miller might call herself a "rookie when it comes to the railroad," but she is experienced enough to know that working at a short line means taking on many different responsibilities. To become more familiar

with these tasks, Miller recently completed a Railroad Track Inspection and Safety Standards course through the University of Tennessee-Knoxville, training that was funded in large part by a scholarship from ASLRRA and former board member Doug Golden.

"We are a short line, so everyone has multiple tasks and I want to be the best asset I can be for our company. Receiving this training is going to allow me to inspect our rails to make sure they are safe and up to code. It was a lot to take in but I cannot wait to put it to good use," said Miller.

In addition to being a full-time executive assistant to Atlantic Railways President John Elkin, Miller is a part-time special agent for the railroad, which requires her to conduct inspections of rail cars and property. Taking the University of Tennessee's track inspection course allows her to expand her special-agent role and do more to assist the one other inspector at Atlantic Railways.

Miller is one of four short line railroad employees who have received a scholarship for industry-specific training in track, bridge and signal inspection and maintenance and/or locomotive and freight car inspection and maintenance through ASLRRA's program. Each scholarship winner received up to \$1,200 to pay for course registration fees and travel, lodging and other related expenses.

"The scholarship was useful because it almost covered the entire cost of the trip. I would have still taken the class, but having the majority paid for was a perk for my boss and the financials of our company," said Miller.

Golden, who retired as president of ASLRRA member Carolina Coastal Railway and has served on ASLRRA's Board of Directors and on the Small Railroad Committee, expressed a desire to support the education and training needs of small railroads. An initial \$12,000 donation from the Douglas Golden-

Mary Cullen Charitable Fund to ASLRRA's Short Line Education Fund made these first scholarships possible.

Scholarships are still available for employees of short line and regional railroads, defined as small railroads earning \$10 million or less in annual revenues. Individuals can apply by completing an <u>online application</u>, and scholarships will be awarded to qualified candidates on a rolling basis until all funds are distributed. ASLRRA Submits Comments for House Committee's Hearing

In November, ASLRRA <u>submitted comments</u> for the record related to the United States House Committee on Transportation & Infrastructure hearing titled <u>"Industry and Labor Perspectives: A Further Look at North American Supply Chain Challenges."</u>

The comments outlined the short line industry's vital contributions to North America's supply chain and urged the committee to avoid actions that would exacerbate supply chain problems, including

efforts to increase truck size and weight, mandate crew sizes, or stifle the use of technology.

ASLRRA encouraged the committee to advance important funding opportunities like the Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements (CRISI) grants program that helps short line freight railroads invest in infrastructure to continue to support efficiency and improvements to the U.S. supply chain.

FAMES Issues Alert Following Fatal Accident

The Fatality Analysis of Maintenance-of-Way Employees and Signalmen (FAMES) Committee has <u>issued an alert</u> following a fatal accident earlier this month involving a contractor.

The contractor was marking rails for scrap when he was fatally struck by a spiker. Although the FAMES Committee has not yet analyzed the accident, it urges roadway workers to remain vigilant while on the job site. This includes managing risks associated with the presence of roadway maintenance machines and to ensure clear lines of communication with workers on the ground and roadway maintenance machine operators.

Unified Regulatory Plan, Published by Biden-Harris Administration, Sets Course for Next Six Months

The Biden Administration's Unified Agenda of Regulatory and Deregulatory Actions (<u>Agenda</u>) was published this week, which includes a Department of Transportation (DOT) Plan with information from the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA).

The agenda reports on the actions administrative agencies plan to issue in the near and long term. Released by the Office of Information and Regulatory Affairs, the agenda provides important public notice and transparency about proposed regulatory and deregulatory actions within the executive branch.

Most relevant to ASLRRA railroad members is the <u>DOT Plan</u>. This plan reviews the actions taken throughout 2021 in response to executive orders and lays out the priorities of the DOT going forward, particularly concerning safety, COVID-19 response, economic growth, climate change and equity.

Of note, the FRA will be continuing work on "pending proceedings to satisfy mandates resulting from the Rail Safety Improvement Act of 2008 (RSIA08), the Passenger Rail Investment and Improvement Act of 2008 (PRIIA), and the FAST Act." FRA's stated regulatory priority for Fiscal Year 2022 is to propose regulations addressing the issue of the requirements for safe minimum train crew size depending on the type of operation.

Senate and House Wrap Up Year-End Business as Holiday Recess Nears

With the holidays nearing, Congress was busy resolving two major legislative matters that had been looming for weeks.

Yesterday, Congress voted to raise the nation's debt limit by \$2.5 trillion, narrowly avoiding debt default and affording the U.S. with the authority to continue paying the government's bills past next year's mid-term elections and into early 2023. And today, Congress passed the National Defense Authorization Act, a sizeable \$770 billion measure that funds defense programs, sending the measure

to President Biden's desk for his signature.

Meanwhile, a path forward on President Biden and the Democrats' Build Back Better bill remains unclear. The measure, which passed the House in November, awaits action in the Senate, where Senate Democrats are working to advance it before Christmas. Ongoing negotiations and parliamentary maneuvering, however, could delay formal consideration until after the holidays.
