DOT Releases RAISE Grant Preliminary Funding Notice

The Department of Transportation (DOT) has issued a <u>preliminary notice of funding opportunity</u> (NOFO) for the Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant program. Available funding for fiscal year (FY) 2023 totals \$1.5 billion for eligible surface transportation infrastructure projects.

Half of awarded funds will go to rural projects. The DOT will issue a final NOFO on or before Dec. 14, with grant applications due Feb. 28. Although short line railroads are not directly eligible for RAISE grants, they can partner with eligible entities to apply for funding. Railroads that have already submitted a CRISI grant application and want the same project considered for a RAISE grant can use many of the materials already prepared for their CRISI package.

Several ASLRRA members have benefitted from RAISE funding through partnerships and other means. For example, a grant awarded to the Florida Department of Transportation will help pay for construction of additional safety measures along a shared-use Florida East Coast Railway and Brightline railway corridor. In addition, the City of Springfield (Illinois) will use RAISE funds to construct a new railroad grade separation over Illinois Midland Railroad and Norfolk Southern rail lines.

A number of resources are available on the DOT website under the RAISE 2023 section of the RAISE homepage. These resources include information on how to apply, webinar recordings and presentation materials from the FY 2022 RAISE cycle, additional guidance on benefit-cost analysis and environmental approvals and more. The agency will also be hosting informational webinars specifically for FY 2023 in the coming months.

Other Federal, State Grant Programs Offer Funding for Rail Projects

Today the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) published the <u>Federal-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail Program (FSP-National) notice of funding opportunity</u>. This program provides grant funding for projects not located on the Northeast Corridor under the Federal-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail Program (FSP-Program).

This program makes \$2.2 billion available for eligible projects. Although FSP-National and FSP-Program are intended for capital projects related to passenger rail services, freight railroads that host or otherwise work with passenger railroads could benefit from this significant federal investment through a partnership with eligible entities. The FRA will publish a separate funding notice for FSP projects located on the Northeast Corridor, which are not eligible for this program.

In addition to these federal programs, railroads in Virginia <u>can also apply for grants</u> with the Virginia Department of Rail and Public Transportation (DRPT). The agency is accepting applications for <u>all its rail, transit and commuter assistance programs</u>. For freight and short line railroads, these programs include the <u>Rail Preservation Fund (RPF)</u>, which is meant specifically to benefit the nine short lines operating in Virginia. There is also the <u>Freight Fund</u> and the <u>Rail Industrial Access (RIA) Program</u>.

The due date for all Virginia DRPT grants is Feb. 1.



Regulatory Update

ASLRRA Joins Letter Requesting Extension to Comment Period for TSA Proposed Rule Notice

ASLRRA joined the Association of American Railroads and other industry associations in <u>submitting a letter</u> to Transportation Security Administrator David Pekoske requesting an extension to the public comment period for the Transportation Security Administration's (TSA) <u>advance notice of proposed rulemaking</u> (ANPRM) concerning surface cyber risk management.

The associations request a 30-day extension to the public comment period in order to compile "meaningful stakeholder comments." The request notes that the TSA's ANPRM is looking for feedback on six broad categories and includes a number of questions on complicated issues, making the current Jan. 17 comment deadline impractical.

TSA's ANPRM seeks input from stakeholders on cybersecurity requirements for owner/operators of higher-risk pipeline and rail operations. The agency wants to understand how pipeline and rail sectors implement cyber risk management and how they can help work toward the enhancement of pipeline and rail cybersecurity.

Small Business Administration Roundtable: ASLRRA to Participate, Invites Members to Join

On Dec. 12, ASLRRA will participate in a Small Business Administration (SBA) roundtable discussing the Federal Railroad Administration's (FRA) proposed minimum crew size rule. The SBA is interested in gathering feedback from Class II and III railroads, and the Association urges its short line railroad members to join the discussion and share their concerns about the rule. Doing so will help the SBA understand the full potential impact of the FRA's crew-size rule and enable the SBA to better advocate on behalf of Class II and III small business railroads.

FRA Reports Describe Studies on Track and Rolling Stock

Two reports from the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) discuss results of studies done on railroad track and rolling stock to examine potential causes of component degradation and safety hazards.

One report describes results from a study on the impact of shoulder ballast cleaning (SBC) on the performance of fine-filled ballast. Repeated vehicle loadings can degrade ballast particles and eventually allow enough degraded ballast fines to accumulate around tie ends, blocking drainage and producing mud pumping, rapid track geometry degradation and potentially accelerating track component degradation. Results of the study show that shoulder drainage due to shoulder cleaning improves drainage and reduces mud pumping, but the effectiveness of SBC varies with climate.

The <u>second report</u> looks at ways to prevent water ingress in railroad bearings. Bearing degradation and defects can lead to the bearing being removed before the end of its normal service life or possible bearing failure, with water damage the leading cause of premature bearing failure. Transportation Technology Center researchers performed three main tests on different seal types to see how well they prevented water vapor and spray from penetrating and damaging railway bearings. There were three overall conclusions reached by the study, including that frictionless seals performed better than rubbing lip seals in water spray testing.

Legislative Update

Chuck Baker Discusses Congressional Outreach in December *Railway Age* Column

While winter holidays are on the horizon, ASLRRA is looking past them to January, when at least 82 new members of Congress will be sworn in and a new set of House committee and subcommittee chairs will be chosen. For the Association, that is when work begins in earnest to familiarize newcomers with the short line industry and policies important to it.

ASLRRA President Chuck Baker discusses this outreach work in his <u>December column</u> for *Railway Age* magazine. He touches on some important policy issues currently facing short lines, namely the Federal Railroad Administration's efforts to mandate two-person train crews and the California Air Resources Board's (CARB) proposal to charge railroads stiff fees depending on the emissions tier of their locomotives.

ASLRRA is active on both fronts. Next week, Baker will testify in a hearing focused on two-person crews and will participate in a Small Business Association roundtable discussing the same topic. Association staff members have been collecting input from members on the burden a manning requirement will impose on small railroads, which will be used in ASLRRA comments on the proposed rule and in other communications with relevant entities concerning the regulation.

Baker also recently traveled to California to speak on behalf of short lines about the CARB proposed locomotive rule during a CARB board meeting. As acknowledged by CARB itself, the fees imposed by this regulation could put some California short lines out of business.

These proposed state and federal rules underscore the importance of getting out and getting in touch with lawmakers to ensure they are familiar with the ways the short line industry contributes to local and national economic development and the impact lawmakers' decisions have on the operational capabilities of these small businesses.
