## Baker Testifies Before Senate Subcommittee on Short Line Contributions, Legislative Priorities

Yesterday, ASLRRA President Chuck Baker testified before the Senate Commerce Committee's Subcommittee on Surface Transportation, Maritime, Freight, and Ports at a hearing titled "Freight Mobility: Strengthening America's Supply Chains and

Competitiveness."



During his May 11 Senate hearing testimony, ASLRRA President Chuck Baker emphasized the positive contributions of short line railroads and the ways Congress can support railroads' efforts through legislation.

The hearing focused on challenges facing the freight industry and ways Congress can enhance U.S. transportation infrastructure and supply chains to benefit American freight movement.

In his <u>testimony</u>, Baker identified four defining characteristics of small railroads and described the contributions of short lines to the national freight rail network, including "providing a safe, competitive, and environmentally friendly low-carbon option" to customers in small communities that would otherwise be cut off from larger markets.

"Short lines are a growth engine - particularly for areas of the country that have not shared in all of the country's economic growth. While we may only move the traffic a few miles to the interchange with the Class I, the service and access we provide each

individual customer is critical to that customer's success. Short lines work relentlessly to create new business opportunities with current and new customers. They invest in technology and innovation that provides increased safety and new opportunities for customers. They are problem solvers, seeking new ways create value for themselves and the communities in which they operate. As any shipper will tell you, logistics transportation costs and service are huge determinants of success and we take that responsibility very seriously," said Baker.

Baker highlighted the environmental benefits of moving freight by rail, describing the fuel savings and emission reductions made by ASLRRA-member short lines while they move hundreds of tons of goods for their customers.

He then moved on to describe short lines' infrastructure priorities, calling for lawmakers to include short lines fully in any new infrastructure investment, improve crossing safety and the RRIF loan program and implement regulatory policies thoughtfully and equitably.

## TSA Final Rule Codifies Deadline Extension for Training Programs

The Transportation Security Administration (TSA) has officially extended the compliance date for submission of security training programs, publishing a <u>final rule</u>.

Those owner/operators falling under the scope of TSA's rule will now have until June 21 to submit required security training programs. The rule requires owner/operators of higher-risk freight

railroad carriers and other transportation modes to provide TSA-approved security training to employees who perform security-sensitive functions.

The submission deadline for these programs has changed several times due to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, with the most recent due date being March 22. If TSA determines another deadline extension is necessary, it will be announced in the *Federal Register*.
