The Association's Busy Week Includes FRA's Crew Size Mandate Discussions and Board, Member Meetings

This meeting was one of several important events this week for ASLRRA and its members.

ASLRRA staff are participating in several important events this week, two held by federal agencies and two Association meetings.

On Monday the <u>Small Business</u> <u>Administration (SBA) held a</u> <u>roundtable discussion</u> with stakeholders to discuss the potential ramifications of the Federal Railroad Administration's (FRA) proposed minimum crew size rule. ASLRRA staff participated in the discussion, helping the SBA better understand how the FRA's rule will impact its small-business short line members.

On Tuesday, ASLRRA staff and members of the Association's Board of Directors met in Washington, D.C. for ASLRRA's annual board meeting. Board

members received an update on the Association's operations from respective staff, as well as committee reports and more.

Today, ASLRRA President Chuck Baker, Senior Vice President of Safety, Regulatory and Environmental Policy Jo Strang and Senior Vice President of Law and General Counsel Sarah Yurasko, along with six other short line representatives, testified during a public hearing held by the FRA to discuss the agency's train crew staffing notice of proposed rulemaking (NPRM).

And on Friday, ASLRRA will hold its 2022 Annual Membership Meeting online. Participants will be able to meet new board members, receive comprehensive Association updates and more. Regulatory Update

ASLRRA Testifies at FRA Hearing on Proposed Rulemaking Concerning Train Crew Size Safety Requirements

ASLRRA staff and members testified today at a <u>hearing on the notice of</u> <u>proposed rulemaking</u> (NPRM) from the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) concerning mandatory minimum crew sizes. ASLRRA President Chuck Baker, Senior Vice President Safety, Regulatory and Environmental Policy Jo Strang and General Counsel and Senior Vice President Law Sarah Yurasko represented the Association.

In his testimony, Baker noted that the NPRM grossly underestimated the number of short lines that currently operate one-person crews and therefore the burden of this regulation on the industry. The proposed rulemaking does not demonstrate any safety benefits for short lines operating with two-person crews versus oneperson crews.

The exceptions and special approval processes provided in the NPRM for small short lines and legacy operations are quite limited and narrow and would force many short lines using one person crews to either hire additional staff or make costly operational adjustments such as adding dispatching, breaking up trains, restricting train speed and adding alerters.

Implementation of this rule as written would risk short lines' ability to service customers, provide an economic engine to the communities in which they operate, and inadvertently cause modal shifts that would not serve the American public well, all for no safety benefit.

ASLRRA urged the FRA to withdraw this NPRM or completely exempt short line railroads from any crew size and crew location mandate.

Also testifying at the hearing were ASLRRA members Mitch Harris of the Rio Grande Pacific Corporation, Robert Bullock of the Florida East Coast Railway, John DeWaele of the Grafton and Upton Railroad, Scott Conner of Transtar LLC, Adam Robillard of the Madison Railroad, and Dewayne Swindall of the Indiana Rail Road Company.

Two RRB Articles Focus on Representative Payees and Information Concerning Next Year's Taxes

The Railroad Retirement Board (RRB) issued a pair of news releases for December, their monthly <u>Question and Answer (Q&A) column</u> and <u>railroad retirement and unemployment insurance tax</u> information for 2023.

The Q&A discusses the appointment of a representative payee who can act on behalf of an annuitant who might be incapable of properly handling benefit payments. The RRB has the authority through the Railroad Retirement Act to determine whether a representative payee is in the annuitant's best interests and then appoint such a payee. The payee can be someone other than the person's legal representative.

The RRB goes on to explain how the agency selects a representative payee and describe payee responsibilities, such as paying for the annuitant's day to day needs. The RRB notes it does not recognize an annuitant's power of attorney when identifying a representative payee.

In the tax article, the RRB says that the amounts of compensation subject to railroad retirement tier I and II payroll taxes will go up in 2023 and tax rates on employers and employees will stay the same. Employers' unemployment insurance contribution rate will have a 1.5 percent surcharge, down from 3.5 percent in 2022.



Lawmakers Closer to Passing Final 2023 Spending Bill

Congress is still trying to come to an agreement on an omnibus spending bill to keep the federal government funded past the current Dec. 16 deadline. Lawmakers are expected to pass another continuing resolution extending that due date for a week to allow both sides to come to an agreement on the bill.

While the potential for an agreement seemed out of reach only days ago, Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Patrick Leahy (D-Vt.) <u>announced</u> on Monday that House and Senate representatives had reached a bipartisan framework for the bill. House Appropriations Committee Chair Rosa DeLauro (D-Conn.) <u>issued</u> a similar statement that same day.

Dec. 15 – FRA Webinar to Discuss Federal-State Partnership Grant Program

The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) will give an overview of the fiscal year (FY) 2022 <u>Federal-State Partnership for Intercity Passenger Rail Grant Program</u> during a webinar on Dec. 15.

In addition to providing a general program overview, FRA representatives will also discuss the application, submission, review and evaluation process. A total of \$2.283 billion in funding is available for capital projects located outside the Northeast Corridor. Although these grants are intended for projects related to passenger rail services, freight railroads that host or otherwise work with passenger railroads could benefit from this significant federal investment through a partnership with eligible entities.
